## Second year of Camp Stars was a great success



Camp Stars kids along with their counselor are costumed and ready for their closing program which was presented to their families and McCurdy Ministries staff.

Camp Stars completed its second year on July 25 with 40 students from kindergarten to 6th grade, nine full time employees, lots of fun and great educational success. Camp Stars met on the McCurdy campus from 8 AM to 3 PM, Monday through Friday for six weeks of the summer with Rio Arriba County providing free breakfast and lunch for all participants 18 and under. To make the program a success our Camp Director Nila Montoya established educational partnerships with Rio Arriba County, Habitat for Humanities, Wells Fargo Bank, US Forest Service, Ghost Ranch Paleontology Museum, Los Alamos County Aquatic Center and Los Alamos Bradbury Science Museum. To help our Camp Stars students make a difference they participated in four service projects including Habitat for Humanity, Blue Star Mothers, Welcome Back Teacher Bags for elementary teachers and Heifer International.

These quotes from staff, students and parents best demonstrate the impact of Camp Stars. One of the teachers said, "The younger kids were so amazed at how big the mustard seed could grow. We talked about how our faith can and should also grow like a mustard seed." One of the students said, "Science was cool. I didn't know how science could be connected to God!" The parent of a student who never missed a day of camp said, "My daughter loved going to camp. She loved all the things you were doing. Even when she did not feel well, she did not want to miss." A couple of grandparents said, "We are so glad that someone is still willing to do something like this for our kids!"

## Gala 18 theme will be "Hand in hand: making a difference"

Plans are being made for Gala 18 which will be held from 6 to 10 PM, Saturday, Feb. 7, 2015, in Memorial Gym on the McCurdy campus. Come enjoy a steak or salmon dinner, entertainment, fellowship as well as silent and live auctions. The cost will be \$60 per ticket and \$35 of each ticket purchased is a tax deductible donation.

Gala 18 will benefit Project Cariño, McCurdy Ministries' mental health counseling program provided free of charge to McCurdy Charter School students and families, McCurdy Charter School Athletics and the McCurdy Ministries Foundation with 85% of the proceeds

of the Gala going to programs that directly benefit MCS students.

Rev. Diana Loomis, Director of Development/Church Relations for McCurdy Ministries says, "The theme for this year will be 'Hand in Hand: making a difference' which portrays the way McCurdy Ministries and McCurdy Charter School (MCS) are working together to make a difference for the students of the Espanola Valley. Most people don't realize between the student enrollment in MCS and McCurdy Ministries programs we touch 26% of the under 18 population of our valley every day."



A little competitive spice is being added to this year's event because each of the MCS athletic teams will be competing to earn their fair share of Gala profits. Each athlete and their families will earn a point for every ticket sold, every item donated to the auctions, every advertisement, every volunteer hour donated and double points will be awarded for every athletic volunteer who helps to clean up the Gala on Sunday, Feb. 8. The end result will be if the Girl's Volleyball Team earns 35% of the total points that team will receive 35% of the profits coming to MCS Athletics. The 2014 share of Gala profits going to MCS Athletics

is estimated to be over \$28,000. If a team earns 35% of the points then they would receive over \$9,800 for team expenses. On the other hand if a team earns 2% of the points, then the profits they would receive \$561.

## Notes from the McCurdy Ministries executive director

The new school year has begun and all over campus is evidence of new hope and new adventures awaiting our children. As I drive to work, I see children making their way to school and I am reminded of a time, not too long ago, when my four children walked to school. We lived on campus and there were instances, when I would see my two youngest running as fast as they could, past my office, to make it into class before the late bell rang.

As parents, we are not given recipes for raising our children. Acknowledging that we do not know all or maybe any of the answers, is probably the best place to start in giving ourselves permission to make mistakes. Each and every child is unique and no matter how many times one has gone

through the process of bringing a child to their first day of school, each time is indeed a new and different experience. The fact is that Our Father, being the wise and loving Father that he is, has given us a community of resources to turn to when we find ourselves at a loss for how to even begin to tackle a new and unfamiliar journey. We need to accept his gift of community and not be afraid to reach out and ask for help, contact our children's teachers to clarify when we do not understand and phone a friend or neighbor when we need a listening ear or a gentle shoulder. At the same time, we need to be willing to be that for others as well. McCurdy Ministries has been working diligently to create plans for state approval of the new building project that will give McCurdy Charter School (MCS) space that will meet the NM Conditional Weighted Index and will be able to house MCS's 584 student capacity. We are looking at a two-story building that will house K–6 grades on the first floor and 7–12 grades on the second floor. Included in the project will be upgrades to Memorial Gymnasium and Pringle Student Center which will allow MCS to have all their operations on the west side of the irrigation ditch that runs through campus. This will leave McCurdy Ministries to run its operations on the east side of the ditch, giving a clear physical boundary for students and school officials to better secure the school campus.

I sincerely thank the McCurdy Ministries staff, volunteers, including our board members, and our community partners for their commitment to God's ministries and their efforts for our children. Each day is filled with clear evidence that we have a gracious and loving God. Just today, I heard from one of the MCS teachers who mentioned MCS had hosted a jamboree for volleyball this past weekend and said the students from the other schools were in awe of the beauty and serenity of our campus. She also mentioned how proud the MCS staff and students were to be a part of McCurdy when they heard the other schools' students complimenting their campus. The beauty of our campus is made possible because of the work of our maintenance staff assisted by hundreds of volunteers from around the country. They work together to cut the weeds, plant the beautiful flowers, mow the lawns, construct "peace gardens" and make our campus a welcoming and peaceful place to be. When the time came for Tom's group to describe the difference they make, he said, "We share hope." Tom went on to tell me, "Diana, that is what we do at McCurdy. We

share hope with the children and youth of the Española Valley." All I could think was, "You are right Tom!" McCurdy has been sharing hope for 102 years.

It all started when a few children in Velarde, NM, asked a visiting stranger, Mellie Perkins, who later became McCurdy's founder, "Will you come be our teacher?" What an audacious, full of hope question that was! Mellie responded by learning Spanish, coming back to the valley, starting a school, transforming lives and sharing a hope that has transformed lives generation after generation. Today McCurdy Ministries shares hope through Project Cariño, the Big Buddy/Little Buddy program, After School Care, the Breakfast and Lunch program, the Peer Conflict Mediation program, McCurdy Preschool, Volunteers in Mission, Camp Stars and by being the landlord for McCurdy Charter School. Every difference we make is made possible by faith in God and a supporter, a volunteer, a donor, a missionary, a teacher who knows that hope transforms lives.

Recently, one of our donors who lives thousands of miles away called to say, "I love what you do at McCurdy. I was only there once many years ago but you make such a difference for the children that I am making McCurdy the beneficiary of my IRA. I trust you all will know how to use these funds to help the children of the valley." It is concrete expressions of hope such as this that has kept McCurdy financially strong for 102 years.

The McCurdy Ministries Board of Directors knows that hope is what fuels our tanks and keeps our ministries going. To make this hope come to fruition for the coming generations of students and their families the board has established the

# Project Cariño news & updates

#### Notes from Amanda

Project Cariño has been busy preparing for the start of therapeutic services for the new school year, planning, Project Cariño programs, attending meetings with Mc-Curdy Charter staff and parents as well as providing crisis intervention services during the month of August.

Late in August, we confirmed that we will have three interns from Highlands University for the 2014–15 school year including Pete Thorson, Carmen Gallegos

and Roberta Paez. They will start their year-long practicum experiences on Sept. 3. This is the first year that we have so many students choose Project Cariño for their field learning experiences and we are pleased!! With our students' help, we can continue to expand our service learning programs by building on the work that was done last year.

Our master-level social work intern, Pete Thorson, comes to us with experience in therapeutic work at various school settings where he has been employed in the past. We plan to have him coordinate our Peer Mediator Program and continue to support training for our students not only in Peer Mediation but also in Restorative Justice in collaboration with MCS staff and administration. In addition, he will have a small clinical caseload of students he will work with individually, and receive intensive supervision from me.

We will also have two bachelor-level interns working with us this school year, who will co-coordinate the Big Buddy/Little Buddy Program continuing the work started by last year's intern. As much as possible, the buddy relationships that were started last year will continue. Our interns will continue to work with MCS staff to help them understand how to support the buddy relationships.

Finally, I wanted to point you to the last page of the newsletter which includes a photo collage of The Buddy Program field trip to Ghost Ranch in Abiquiu, NM last spring. The group learned about dinosaurs, particularly those whose fossils have been found on the ranch and tin smithing which is a traditional Northern New Mexico craft. They completed a tin project and made molds of fossils to bring home. The photos demonstrate the joy, the fun and the support the buddies bring to their relationships. What you can't see is the difference the buddy relationships make in the educational process every day. *Amanda Trujillo Gonzales* 

#### Notes from Michelle Esquibel

With the addition of a second therapist to Project Cariño last January, Project Cariño was able to revive the Peer Mediator Program. This program was established to create a culture of safety at McCurdy Charter School (MCS), as well as build on the communication and peace-making skills of the students and staff. With two full-time therapists as well as bachelor and master's level interns staffing Project Cariño, this valuable program is back and attracting many quality students.

How does it work? We have so many compassionate and capable students on our campus that want to serve as Peace-Makers! It is difficult to choose the 15 elementary, middle and high school students that will serve during the school year. Applicants complete a questionnaire that gives us insight into their communication skills and desire to be helpers. We also obtain references and interview each applicant. Once accepted the students are trained in age-appropriate mediation and conflict resolution interventions. Once trained the student mediators are ready for action at school. Fellow students and staff can request a student mediator's assistance in resolving a wide range of conflicts including bullying.

Students have shared they feel safer at school because they know they can easily get help with a problem. They like relating to a student mediator close to their age because he or she can check in frequently and help the mediation contract be observed. In addition, families have expressed pride in the difference student mediators make because they have experienced a positive shift in family dynamics

as the mediators practice their skills at home. Other families have appreciated the mediation process helping to reduce or eliminate a bullying situation or save a friendship at school that was on the brink.

Teachers and staff notice a reduction in violence and an increase in empathy among the students. One teacher said, "There is a ripple effect after every mediation. As each conflict is resolved and a new and healthier pattern of behavior takes over, more students begin to catch on and treat each other differently, even if they were not involved directly with the mediation!" *Michelle Esquibel*














# Ministries buddy outing to Ghost Ranch
