"Making God's difference through McCurdy Ministries Community Center has been the highlight of my 45 years in ministry. I have loved being part of a team making such a wonderful difference for the children, youth and families of the Española Valley!" says Rev. Diana Loomis.

After 13 years, 10.5 as McCurdy's development director and 2.5 years as public/private partnership director, Rev. Loomis

has submitted her resignation, effective April 30, due to health reasons. During her tenure, she oversaw the raising of \$9.2 million for McCurdy, including \$785,500 for the capital campaign. In addition, during her time as public/private director, she secured \$1.9 million of grant commitments for the McCurdy "Live, Work, Educate, Recreate Planned Community".

Loomis says that she is most proud of the trust and relationships she developed with donors and supporters across the country over the last 13 years. During her tenure, she spoke at five annual conferences, conducted spiritual retreats, devotionals and programs for countless local churches, districts, and conference UMWs, taught at two conference Mission U Schools, and preached at dozens and dozens of churches. She welcomed hundreds of McCurdy Volunteers in Mission in her home for chili con carne dinners. Diana reflects "I loved visiting with our donors, learning about their lives and faith, and updating them on the lifesaving difference McCurdy makes in the Española Valley. Over the last 13 years I, made deep friendships with many donors who have made a wonderful difference in my life!"

On the McCurdy campus, she taught a living history independent study to help six seniors create a pictorial and video history of McCurdy for the Centennial Celebration, created the Camp Stars summer camp concept, developed a community wide mid-week ministry concept called








Camp Stars is open for registration and will be July 8-12, July 15-19, and July 22-26 for elementary aged kids. We will be using supplies and curriculum which

#### Project Cariño brings hope and healing to children and their families

#### Stories from Project Carino with Bill Clapp, the new Director of Project Carino

#### **Communicating Through Play**

Late in their 4th grade year, a child was referred to Project Cariño because he had been constantly daydreaming and blocking out reality. He was isolating himself from others and no longer doing well on school work. Unfortunately, it was to the point where he couldn't or wouldn't focus on class work or real life. The one thing that seemed to bring joy to his life was Marvel superheroes. He even would create his own using tape and glue and crayons to bring them to life. He took to making special arm bands to wear claiming that they bestowed on him superpowers and force fields for protection. He was escaping daily into a dream world of his own making.

The therapist joined the student in his fantasies involving the Marvel Universe as he acted out his stories in the playroom. He was communicating through his play.

Bill shares, "Child play therapy is a way of being with the child that honors their unique developmental level and looks for ways of helping in the "language" of the child—play. Licensed mental health professionals therapeutically use play to help their clients, most often children ages three to 12 years, to better express themselves and resolve their problems. Play therapy works best when a safe relationship is created between the therapist and client, one in which the latter may freely and naturally express both what pleases and bothers them."

Slowly, our now 6th grader has learned to balance out his life and better handle some of his personal experiences. He is still very creative and imaginative, but now he has been able to work on his personal issues. He is getting along much better with fellow students and at home. By using play therapy, this student was able to blend reality with imagination and creativity to be able to reach deeply into his concerns and find help in a more balanced approach.

### **Group Settings and Individual Counseling for Older Students with Anxiety**

One day, a sophomore student was referred to Project Cariño in a crisis situation. He would go in cycles, it was related, and about every six months he would become suicidal, truly wishing he were dead. This was one of those times. He was a sensitive and introspective student and had been adopted earlier in his life.

After being seen individually for several months, his counselor felt he might benefit from a new small group that was being offered. It was specifically for teens aged 6th grade through 10th grade, dealing with issues of anxiety. For 8 weeks, the students met

and learned more about anxiety. Topics such as:

- What is anxiety?
- When is anxiety a good thing, reminding us what we need to do, and when is anxiety unproductive?
- Learning techniques on deep breathing and what to do when a panic attack comes.
- How to handle severe stress.

The counselor had the students draw their anxiety, give it a name, and speak to it, taking control of the situation instead of being controlled by it. It was explained that anxiety was like a spirit, it can protect you, so you can thank it for that role in your life. But there comes a point when it is too demanding, when you don't need it interfering in your life any longer and it is time to let it go.

Some students were not yet ready to let go of their feelings of anxiety after 8 weeks. They needed more time to come to terms with this part of their life. In this particular student's case, that was exactly where he was.

He continued coming to Project Cariño and returned after about six months very changed. He related that he was now managing his life much better and the feelings of depression and anxiety had resolved. He was blossoming and engaging others in his life. He reported he was happier, more relaxed, and enjoying life.

At Project Cariño, our counselors and student interns take time to know the children and teens that have been placed in their care. It takes time—they never know how long is needed—so they are patient and they are there for each one of them. At Project Cariño, there is time for each student because so many people help us make that gift available.

Wednesday Communidad (which she still hopes will come to fruition), created a partnership with First UMC Los Alamos, which resulted in many Thanksgiving and Spring Festivals, and created a partnership with the NM Conference United Women of Faith to plan and hold several October Fests for the entire community. Diana oversaw the Gala, Centennial Celebration, 110 th Anniversary Celebration, and donor dinners. She was responsible for updating and expanding McCurdy communications efforts including the McCurdy Message, Facebook page, website, blast emails, and Volunteer Newsletter edited by Linda Polson. During the pandemic, she began publishing a weekly devotional sent out to 2,000+ volunteers, donors, and supporters to help share hope during a difficult time and created a digital Volunteer in Mission experience conducted through zoom meetings with local churches, mission teams, and United Women of Faith groups.

Diana was born in Oklahoma, raised in Albuquerque, and has always considered

Northern New Mexico her home. Her family owned a cabin in Angel Fire for 35 years. She first began spending time in the Española Valley when she was in elementary school. She loved traveling to Española during Christmas to see the Explorer Scouts line the streets and walls of the town with farolitos. She attended college in Missouri and, there felt the call to ministry in 1977. She received Masters of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry degrees from Saint Paul School of Theology in Kansas City and served local churches in the Missouri Conference of the United Methodist Church from 1979 to 2011. During her ministry, she was a Global Ministries congregational redevelopment consultant and developed long range strategic planning, church growth, and nonprofit redevelopment skills which she employed across the country her entire ministry. In 2011, she retired from the Missouri Conference to move home to NM where her two brothers live and began work at McCurdy. In retirement, she will continue to reside
